**Victims of Crime Act (VOCA)-Office of Victims of Crime,**

*-provides substantial funding to state victim assistance and compensation programs. The agency supports trainings designed to educate criminal justice and allied professionals regarding the rights and needs of crime victims. OVC is one of five bureaus and four offices with grant-making authority within the Office of Justice Programs, U.S. Department of Justice.*

**Violence Against Women Act (VAWA)-Office on Violence Against Women**

*-offers grant programs and funding opportunities aimed at keeping victims safe and hold offenders accountable for their crimes.*

### **Title IVB: Promoting Safe and Stable Families**

-goal is to prevent the unnecessary separation of children and families, improve the quality of care and services to children and their families and ensure permanency for children by reuniting them with their parents, by adoption or by another permanent living arrangement. States are to spend most of the funding for services that address: family support, family preservation, time-limited family reunification and adoption promotion and support. The services are designed to help State child welfare agencies and eligible Indian tribes establish and operate integrated, preventive family preservation services and community-based family support services for families at risk or in crisis. Funds go directly to child welfare agencies and eligible Indian tribes to be used in accordance with their 5-year plans. Other grant funds are set aside for nationally funded evaluation, research, and training and technical assistance projects. In addition, funds are set aside for court improvement programs.

*Community Based Grants for the Prevention of Child Abuse and Neglect (CBCAP): support for community-based, prevention-focused programs and activities*

#### **Child Abuse Prevention and Treatment Act (CAPTA) State Grants:**

-provides funds for states to improve their child protective service systems (CPS). Reauthorized by the Keeping Children and Families Safe Act of 2003, the program requires States to provide assurances in their 5 yr child and Family Services plan that the State is operating a Statewide child abuse and neglect program that includes several new programmatic requirements. The reauthorization of CAPTA places a strong emphasis on interagency collaborations across child protective services, health, mental health, juvenile justice, education and other public and private agencies.

#### **Justice Assistance Grant (JAG) Program:**

*-the Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant Program ([www.doj.gov/BJA](http://www.doj.gov/BJA) and <http://www.ojp.usdoj.gov/BJA/grant/jag.html>) allows states and local governments to support a broad range of activities to prevent and control crime and to improve the criminal justice system. JAG replaces the Byrne Formula and Local Law Enforcement Block Grant (LLEBG) programs with a single funding mechanism that simplifies the administration process for grantees. The JAG purpose areas are: law enforcement programs, prosecution and court programs, prevention and education programs, corrections and community corrections programs, drug treatment programs and planning, evaluation and technology improvement programs.*

#### **Local Grants:**
