Case Review Video:

-a local CBS affiliate helped produce a video for use as training for MDT Case Review. MDT members play their parts at a case review meeting-first in a highly dysfunctional manner and then in an open, sharing, healthy manner. It helps to underscore the good, the bad and the ugly of the case review process in a somewhat humorous manner. Run: approximately 20 minutes and is useful for a follow-up with a discussion about what makes teamwork. Cost: approximately \$10.00. -NBC Dateline has a video that illustrates the missed opportunities to save a young girl named Kayle McKean in FL. It demonstrates a case where the abuse was reported by the school, but through a series of miscommunications between law enforcement and CPS, the case results in the death of the child. -Scared Silent is a video narrated by Oprah Winfrey from the early 1990's. There is a 15 minutes clip in which a young woman in her 20's is interviewed about the 15+ year history of being molested by her father. The father and mother (non-offending) are also interviewed. In their recollections, you hear all of the things he did, the grooming, and what transpired over the years. It is a good tool for training because after allowing trainees to view it, you can show and ask participants what they saw in terms of grooming occurring over the years. A later clip of the tape interviews other perpetrators. This video, although older, also helps people to understand some of the more difficult issues i.e. why someone might not report for many years and how the abuse could continue for so long.
